CONSERVANCY BOARD CHANGES

For nearly 10 years, Willowsford Conservancy has been under the stewardship of the Willowsford founder. After a decade of sweat, toil, planning and funding, the Conservancy is in a very healthy position because of the founder's vision, persistence and patience.

On May 18, the developer passed the torch to the new Board of Trustees that began its term. Your new Board includes the resident names signed above, as well as Mark Trostle from the Willowsford development team, who will remain on the board for the next year to help with the transition, as well as Avi Sareen, a terrific environmental consultant who lends his expertise as we collectively govern the Conservancy.

W OTHER QUICK UPDATES

At each board meeting, the Conservancy's executive director, Iris Gestram, and her team provide a detailed report of operations, opportunities and challenges. Here are a few updates of note:

Pinewoods Loop Trail

• Many of you in The Grove have noticed changes to the Pinewoods Loop Trail. A large portion of the trail has been rerouted from a sewer easement to inside the woods. Why? This is part of a planned project this year to make Pinewoods Loop more accessible for individuals with wheelchairs, strollers and mobility challenges of any kind. The sewer easement was simply too difficult a terrain to meet this goal, so a better path was created through the woods. Another section will be rerouted soon for the same purpose.

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CSA Farm Shares and Farmstand Online

- The 2021 Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) season begins next week, May 25! Soon, we'll all see the farm truck making deliveries to members. The farm sold out of all its shares this year, so community support remains strong:
- 350 shares of vegetables
- 200 egg shares
- 75+ flower shares
- 60 meat shares

Those shares yield about \$350,000 in revenue to keep our farm going. Of course, with more than 2,000 homes in Willowsford, not everyone can (or wants to) participate in CSA shares. However, you still can sign up for Farm Stand Online, which will alert you when there's additional produce and other goods available for purchase each week (hello, summer tomatoes!). Planting Trees on Conservancy Property

• Yes, it is possible to partner with the Conservancy to plant trees near your homes on Conservancy property. We have a process (and form!) much like the HOA (in fact, it's the same licensing form). We're going to review that form as a Board and then add it and additional information to the Conservancy website so you can easily view how this works if you're interested (and if it's approved). Of course, we want to encourage more trees, native plants and other beneficial habitat – and we'd be happy to work with you.

Fill Your Fire Pits with Conservancy Firewood

• As residents, we see that list of DRC approved projects, many of which include firepits and fireplaces. Be sure to stock up on firewood from the Conservancy — wood that is from our land and not imported from elsewhere, which could introduce pests to our community. Check

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Cleaning Up Our Land

• A huge thank you to many residents who helped pick up trash and other debris on Earth Day. We appreciate the support in keeping the Conservancy clean not just for us as human residents, but for the benefit of our natural neighbors, too. As you're on trails or other Conservancy land this spring and summer, we encourage you to pick up any trash that you might be able to handle and dispose of it properly. You'll be hearing more from us as Board about volunteering and helping to keep our land clean in the coming months.

Help Eradicate Garlic Mustard

• Speaking of cleaning up our land, we need your help before June! The invasive species, garlic mustard, needs to be removed from along our trails before it sets seed next month. We have a handful of volunteers so far, but the Land Stewardship Team could use more hands. Please help us tackle the invasive plant problem by jumping on a trail near you and pulling up garlic mustard. By pulling it up by hand and stuffing them in trash bags we can help reduce the rate at which this invasive plant spreads.
