TREE OF HEAVEN & SPOTTED LANTERNFLY



Tree of Heaven (Ailanthus altissima) is a fast-growing, invasive tree originally from China that has spread widely across the United States, often thriving in disturbed soils along roadsides, vacant lots, and field edges. While its ability to grow almost anywhere makes it highly competitive against native plants, its presence is especially concerning because it serves as the preferred host for the invasive Spotted Lanternfly (Lycorma delicatula). The Spotted Lanternfly is a destructive insect that feeds on the sap of more than 70 plant species, including grapes, fruit trees, and hardwoods, weakening them and making them more vulnerable to disease and stress.

The close association between Tree of Heaven and the Spotted Lanternfly has complicated management efforts, as controlling the tree is often a key strategy in reducing lanternfly populations and slowing their spread. Together, these two invasive species pose significant ecological and economic threats to forests, agriculture, and landscapes.




